


Take a closer look at our Key Vocabulary:

Key Vocabulary	Definition
Ancient Greece	An ancient civilisation based around the Greek peninsula and the surrounding islands.
Athenian	People who lived in the city-state of Athens.
Spartan	People who lived in the city-state of Sparta. They were known for being great warriors.
Democracy	A system of government where the people can vote to decide things. Athens was the first city-state to develop this system.
Persia	An empire to the east of Greece, ruled by kings. Persia tried to invade Greece. Ancient Persia is modern Iran.
Olympics	A religious festival held in honour of Zeus, attended by people from all over Greece.
The Persian Wars	A series of wars fought by the Greek city-states and the Persian Empire over a time period of almost half a century.

Civilization = meaning becoming a society, from the Latin word 'civilis' meaning society. A civilization is a well organised group of people who live together, building cities, writing, making laws and producing food.

What are they called?

Unlike Ancient Egypt, Ancient Greek civilisation did not begin near a big, flooding river like the Nile.

Greece is mostly a rocky, dry land, broken up by many hills and mountains. The hills and mountains kept groups of people apart.

Some of these groups grew into larger communities which had their own leaders and became 'city-states'.

Greece wasn't one country, but a civilisation made up of citystates, which fought frequently.

Athens


The most famous of the Greek city-states. It was the home of democracy, where people were allowed to vote for their own rulers. It is now the capital city of Greece.

Olympia

The site of the original Olympic Games, where all of the different Greek city-states would compete.

Sparta

Another city-state, famous for developing the greatest warriors of Ancient Greece.



Crete

The largest of the Greek islands, and the mythical home of King Minos and the Minotaur.

Macedonia

The home of Alexander the Great, the greatest military commander of Ancient Greece.

Troy

Site of the famous war, between the Greeks and the Trojans, which ended with the building of a wooden horse.


Mount Olympus

The highest mountain in Greece and the mythical home of the twelve Greek Gods. The Gods were like humans, but eternal, and lived in a cloud palace.
