Talking Tuesday

The aim of talking Tuesday is to spend one day a week supporting your child's communication and language skills which is fundamental in enabling your child to access the EYFS curriculum. Outlined in the slides below are activities to try at home based on the core text for the week in school.

Expectations in Communication and Language in Nursery

- Enjoy listening to longer stories and can remember much of what happens.
- Sing a large repertoire of songs.
- Pay attention to more than one thing at a time, which can be difficult.
- Know many rhymes, be able to talk about familiar books, and be able to tell a long story.
- Be able to express a point of view and to debate when they disagree with an adult or a friend, using words as well as actions.
- Use a wider range of vocabulary.
- Develop their communication but may continue to have problems with irregular tenses and plurals, such
 as 'runned' for 'ran', 'swimmed' for 'swam'.
- Start a conversation with an adult or a friend and continue it for many turns.
- Understand a question or instruction that has two parts, such as: "Get your coat and wait at the door".
- Develop their pronunciation but may have problems saying: some sounds: r, j, th, ch, and sh multi-syllabic words such as 'pterodactyl', 'planetarium' or 'hippopotamus'.
- Use talk to organise themselves and their play: "Let's go on a bus... you sit there... I'll be the driver."
- Understand 'why' questions, like: "Why do you think the caterpillar got so fat?"
- Use longer sentences of four to six words.

Sing the song 'When Goldilocks went to the house of the bears'









Dear Zoo.... 'I wrote to the zoo to send me a pet . . .' what animals can you find in the story? Young children will love lifting the flaps to discover the animals the zoo has sent - a monkey, a lion and even an elephant! But will they ever manage to send the perfect pet? Listen to the story.

Pets You may already have a pet you could talk about or if you could ask for a pet what would you have? Have a go at creating a picture of your pet. I wonder if it has arms, legs, eyes, ears? Talk about what these would look like: long, fluffy, rough, stick up, floppy, friendly, noisy. Talk together about how you would look after this pet, what you would feed it and where could it sleep?




Conversations about animals Look at other books, magazines or real animals. Listen to what your child says about them and gradually add some new words at their level of understanding. Discuss what they look like with a range of describing words e.g., enormous, tiny, tall, gigantic. Where do these animals live: jungle, sea/ocean, under stones, tropical/hot countries? What might they eat.....plants, other animals?

This is a lovely book to help children learn vocabulary, especially for descriptive words such as 'hairy', 'slimy' and 'baggy'. You could build on this by playing games with children – for example, put out a range of objects or cuddly toys and ask the children to guess which one you are talking about based on your description.

Once children are familiar with this book, check if they can hear the rhymes within the text. You can also choose some words such as 'bat' or 'small' and see how many rhyming words children can think of, or play games where children have to shout out or ring a bell when words that you say do not rhyme.

Can you find objects that begin with 'm'?







Have you ever been lost? What should you do if you find yourself separated from your family? Look at the expression of the monkey throughout the story. How is he feeling?

As you read, ask your child to guess what is going to happen next. (Example: "Who do you think the footprints belong to?" or "Where do you think Mondi is?")



Handa often asks, "Where is Mondi?" after finding new animals. Encourage your child to ask this question while you read the story.




Go on a number walk. Look around outside and count the things you see. (Example: cars, trees or people.)



In the book, Handa can not find Mondi. Talk with your child about a time when you lost something. Suggest the steps you take to find lost things. (Example: "Think of where you last had it."

Mondi is a hen and begins with 'h'. How many things can you find in your home that makes a 'h' sound.

Identify the rhyming words used throughout the book.


Learn about ladybirds
